Student Activities

Fifth Year Politics & Society Class in Belgium

The 5th year Politics and Society class completed their annual visit to Belgium this year. Despite the distractions of waffles, chocolates, pizza, and crepes, students managed to make it to the Parliament of the European Union in Brussels where they received an informative talk from Roisin who works as a translator in the EU. They learned about the role of the EU, their local representatives, what was involved with being a translator in the EU, followed by a visit to the hemicycle, the seat of the European Parliament. Students also made a visit to the interactive Parlamentarium where they learned about the history of the EU and how it functions. Within Brussels, students wandered around the Grand Place, visiting the Manneken Pis, Galeries Royales, and many chocolate shops along the way. The following day, the class made their way to Bruges where they could visit the local sites, sample some waffles, and take a boat along the canals.

This visit was in recognition of the 'Gold Award' the schools TY GAA Future Leaders Programme received this year as a result of their excellent work.

To mark the visit, a series of events were planned on the day which was entitled 'MCS Future Leaders, Future Stars'. This was the name given to highlight the role the school plays along the pathway from 1st year right through to intercounty stars today. To illustrate this, MCS staff members and Laois hurlers Aaron Dunphy (Captain) and Bryan Bredin were joined by intercounty players and past pupils, Ryan Mullaney, Jer Quinlan (Hurling) and Niall Dunne (Football) along with the National League Trophies which both teams won already this year. Also in attendance on the day were Laois GAA Chairman PJ Kelly, Secretary Niall Handy along with the head of Laois Games Development, Shane Keegan. Former GAA President and local Trumera man Liam O'Neill was also welcomed.

To mark the day, this year's TY Future Leaders group hosted 2 tournaments for the 1st year students of the school - one in Ladies Football and the other in hurling. In what was glorious weather for football and hurling, every match was keenly contested and there were some brilliant pieces of skill on show. The respect shown by all players, coaches and officials was also outstanding on the day. The finalists on the day along with match officials lined up and got to greet the GAA President and Laois Chairman PJ Kelly akin to what might be seen in Croke Park. True to form, Mr Burns had a friendly word for all students - something they will surely remember.

The Ladies Football tournament was aptly won by the team named 'Laois' who were captained by Robyn Dooley who was presented with the trophy by Jarlath Burns.

It was also a poignant day as the 1st year hurling tournament winners were presented with the Adam Kirwan Memorial Trophy in memory of the late past pupil of MCS. Adam's parents, Lourda & Paul, sister Marie and Grandparents were there to present the trophy to winning captain of the 'Limerick' team, Leo Guilfoyle. Adam was remembered for his contribution to the school, his love of sport and hurling and a young man who made such a huge impact and always with a smile on his face.

The GAA President was invited to the stage 'as Gaeilge' by students Ruaidhri Kavanagh and Donnacha O'Neill, and in his address, Mr. Burns spoke about the warmth and positive atmosphere he felt throughout the school. He spoke about the beautiful facilities and grounds of the school and urged the students to appreciate how fortunate they are to attend a school with these facilities on hand. He spoke about the importance of remembering in the GAA and how heartened he was to see Adam Kirwan's memory being kept alive in the school and in the wider community. In relation to the Future Leaders Programme, he stated that the great event organised by the students today was evidence of the positive role that they can all play in their communities into the future.

Finally, Principal, Ms Kathryn O'Brien thanked all guests for attending and making the time and effort to support the day. The Global Village by Abbie Khumalo (1st year)

For Intercultural Day I brought in traditional fashion jewellery and displayed it in the canteen. A few questions that people had were, where would you wear the jewellery? You would wear this jewellery pretty much anywhere and sometimes in the rural parts of South Africa, but you could really wear the jewellery anywhere, another question that people had was, how much was the jewellery, unfortunately I'm not too sure how much they cost, but if I had to guess I would say in between 80-100 rand because it's for royalty. There's different types of beading in my culture, the beading that I displayed was formal but you could also wear it pretty much anywhere. However, if you had a spiritual calling you would be given a certain type of beading called "ubuhlalu" which typically is prayed for before being given to the person with a calling. These beads will belong only to the person with the spiritual calling and they can't be given to anyone else. If I had a calling and was given the beads not even my mother would be allowed to take the beads from me because they were a prayer given specifically to me. I loved showing and explaining my culture to everyone because of how interested they were in learning about the culture. I hope I display again and represent South Africa the next time we have an intercultural day at the school so that I potentially show even more jewellery or even some food. This was an overall amazing experience for me and I enjoyed it very much.



LCA 5 & 6 Prison visit by Leighlon Marum

Our teacher Ms Donnelly organised for all of the Leaving Certificate Applied students to visit Midlands Prison in Portlaoise. When we arrived we were met by Jimmy Grehan a prison officer from Mountrath who kindly brought us on a tour. The whole group were impressed with his talk and learnt a lot from what he said about the prison system in Ireland. He explained the different types of convictions and sentences people get for different crimes. We got a full run down of the different courts we have in Ireland. A lot of us, including the teachers, were shocked to learn the prison is nothing like what we see on films. We got to experience what it's like when a prisoner is first brought into a prison. I found it very interesting to visit some of the parts of the prison that we were allowed into and experience what inmates do on a daily basis. They are given opportunities to do some of the subjects we do in school like woodwork and PE. We also got a talk from another prison officer on what we needed to do to become prison officers in the future for anyone looking to go into the career. All in all it was a very enjoyable trip. They are working with wire and willow to create lanterns and gothic style windows inspired by gothic stained glass. They have taken their work out of the school by visiting the local church in Mountrath to do measurements and see how proportions are such an integral part of gothic architecture. They will be working on models now based on their measurements as well as painting their stained glass. The 5th years are really enjoying this hands on experience of working with an artist.
